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| Learning outcomes and assessment criteria | Knowledge of social conditions within the activities and field of the internship host, with particular regard to the aspects on which the student chooses to write a project. Insight into the theoretical, methodological and analytical approaches and practical utility of the concepts of Global Studies and Politics. Overall content

Learning during the internship takes place through a mixture of practical work, reflections on the encounter between theory and practice, and independent compilation of the internship report. The writing of the internship report takes place under the guidance of an internship supervisor.

Teaching and working methods

Students are themselves responsible for securing an internship host and for the practical implementation of the internship, including ensuring that both their tasks for the internship host and their obligations to the University are fulfilled. The internship must be approved by the Study Board before it is commenced. It is expected that the semester's work will be distributed as 3/4 for the internship host and 1/4 for the University (equivalent to approximately 540-600 hours for the internship and about 200 hours of university work). The intern's main activities must be described, and must lie within the fields of both Global Studies and Politics. The student has obligations towards both subjects. Overall, Global Studies receives an internship project, and Politics receives a number of tasks.

**Obligations towards Global Studies: **

Internship project (one product) The problem statement of the internship project must relate to theoretical or empirical issues drawn from the field of Global Studies, and which the internship at the host organisation (or its activities) provides an opportunity to illuminate, but may otherwise be freely chosen by the student. Students are encouraged to focus on issues in which aspects of Politics can be brought into play.

The completed internship project that is individually prepared must include:

1. An executive summary. The summary must take into account the contents of the project and the significant points that a reader should be aware of.

2. A main part: including a mandatory literature review, which provides an overview of the most recent research in the academic field that the internship project deals with (state of the art literature review).

Obligations towards Politics: Politics receives a concluding written assignment, consisting of three reflection assignments (three products).

The internship project must contain the following:

- Reflections on (a) the use of social scientific methods at the internship venue, and (b) a
 discussion of either how the internship venue could make more optimal use of various
 methodological approaches, or an example of how the internship venue could organise
 an assignment using various social scientific methods, together with their strengths and
 weaknesses in the light of the special interests of the internship venue.
- Reflections on theories within Politics that are particularly relevant to the internship venue and/or the field of activity of the internship venue. The choice of theories must be argued, with reference to scientific articles/texts. The scope of the referenced literature must be at least 300 pages.
- 3. Memorandum for internship venue. The subject of the memorandum may be freely chosen by the student, but must be relevant to the internship venue and lie within the subject field of Politics. The memorandum might for example consist of a policy brief, a reasoned recommendation for future areas of action, or a reasoned proposal for organisational change.

Teaching language

Form of examination (p1)

The internship portfolio is assessed twice. Once for subject 1 and once for subject 2. The assessment for Subject 1 also includes an oral exam.

The internship portfolio consists of 4 products, which are made or partially made during the internship. The portfolio's specific products and the recommended size (character limits) for the individual products are described under 'Teaching and working methods'.

The character limit of the internship portfolio is: 38,400-84,000 characters, including spaces. The character limit include the cover, table of contents, bibliography, figures and other illustrations, but exclude any appendices.

The portfolio (incl. other products that are part of the portfolio) must be submitted at eksamen.ruc.dk at the same time. Handing in the portfolio or parts of the portfolio to the supervisor for feedback, cannot replace the upload to eksamen.ruc.dk.

Subject 1:

The exam begins with a presentation based on the report, presentation incl. questions may last up to $5\,\mathrm{minutes}$

The presentation is followed by a dialogue between the student and the assessors based on the internship project report.

There may be posed questions related to the specific subject areas.

The assessment is an assessment of both the internship portfolio and the oral performance. Spelling and communication skills in the report are part of the assessment.

Time allowed for exam including time used for assessment: 30 minutes.

Permitted support and preparation materials at the oral exam: All.

Assessment: 7-point grading scale. Moderation: Internal co-assessor.

Subject 2:

Assessment of the internship portfolio as a written product within the subject areas. Spelling and communication skills in the report are part of the assessment.
